

An Evangelization Story

THREE STRANGERS AND OUR FATHER

On a sunny winter day, parked near the Cathedral, I sat in my car enjoying the unexpected warmth of a February day in New England. Having arrived early for the daily Mass at noon, I noticed an elderly man on the sidewalk in front of me, walking in the direction of my car. Behind me another car had just parked and a tall, lanky young man came into view in my side mirror. The old man, plainly down-and-out both by appearance and by gait, called out to the young man who walked over to him and stood listening quietly, holding two small but thick prayer books in his hands.

Intending to slip past the men who were now but a couple of feet away from my parked car, I emerged from the driver's seat and, without glancing at either of them, turned quickly to walk towards the Cathedral. Undeterred, the old man addressed me, asking if I had a couple of dollars for a bus ride to get to an eye doctor appointment. I looked at his face; his left eye was swollen shut. "I think I do," I said, and went for my wallet. Taking out crisp dollar bills I handed them to him, saying "God bless you," to which he promptly replied, "God bless you," and then immediately added, "I'm a Roman Catholic" in a decisive, affirming voice. Spontaneously I felt inspired to suggest, "Can we say a prayer together?"

"The Our Father," the ill-clad man proclaimed decisively. There we three stood, in the middle of a sidewalk in a small northeastern city, a tall young man, myself (a little old woman), together with an elderly destitute man. Forming a triangle, we bowed our heads and prayed the Lord's Prayer together. Only such a Father as ours could have orchestrated such an impromptu sidewalk prayer meeting with three hitherto strangers.

The three of us then began to walk towards the Cathedral, the young man conversing with the old man. A friend of mine was also heading towards the Cathedral; I called out to her, and we chatted briefly before entering our Father's magnificent home. The old man continued on his way; the young man also entered the Cathedral.

A CONVERSION STORY BY A HOLY APOSTLES STUDENT

PREFACE

I do not publicly praise my good works before others because if I do so, then their admiration of my works becomes my final reward – and then there is no reward remaining for me from God, either here on earth or in heaven (Mt. 6:1-4). Therefore, I do good works secretly, but the Lord, who sees those good works, rewards me as he sees fit (Mt. 6:5-6) and my future treasures are laid up for me in heaven (Mt. 6:19-21). The only reason this story is shared with you is...[deleted for confidentiality]. Otherwise, neither you nor anyone else would ever read about or hear about this real event. We, the servants of the Lord, serve our God in secret, specifically by helping the spiritual and corporal needs of others, when the appropriate circumstances are presented to us.

SCENARIO

My wife and I bought a condo for her mother. After she died, a neighbor recommended renting it to two brothers named John and Jim Doe. John Doe was a convicted felon with multiple arrests spanning several years, to include battery on a law enforcement officer. However, he was off probation, and he had served his time in prison, and he was actively attending AA and NA meetings, so we agreed to rent the condo to the two Doe brothers.

After about four years, the brothers were suddenly unable to pay rent, so we gave them deadlines for when they could pay half the amount, and the rest would be forgiven forever. That worked for only one month and then the brothers said they were destitute. They had no money, and they reportedly could not find jobs. In reality, John Doe had been fired from every local job, and he had burned all his employment-bridges. Subsequently, no one would hire him anymore. Jim Doe said he was applying for jobs every day, but when I pressed him, he admitted that he never left the condo to apply for (continued on page six)

(continued from page 5) a job. Instead, he allegedly applied for jobs via online applications. I explained to Jim that without specialized educational credentials, it was highly unlikely that a manager would hire him, based only on an online application and without conducting an in-person interview, and Jim needed to meet the managers in-person to get hired. I told Jim exactly where to go "in-person" for a job and he was hired on-the-spot as a custodian.

After Jim found employment, he was only able to make one last half-payment for his monthly rent, so I had another meeting with him. During the meeting, I recognized that Jim was a broken man and that he would never be able to become a contributing member of society, unless someone "gave him a chance," so I told Jim that he could stay in the condo rent free, indefinitely, until he could "get back up on his feet." He ended up staying rent free for a little over 8 months, until he died unexpectedly (more on that in a minute). I was still paying monthly condo fees and property taxes (half the rent money covered the condo fees). The Lord has blessed my wife and I with the ability to do so.

Meanwhile, Jim's brother (John Doe) fell off the AA/NA wagon and he began generating condo complaints from unsigned anonymous letters from "condo management." We interviewed John Doe several times about the ongoing allegations, but he denied all the anonymous accusations. Since the allegations were from unsigned letters, we consistently gave John the benefit of the doubt.

On one occasion, when I was alone with John, I presented Jesus to him. He was a backslidden Roman Catholic, so he was familiar with the Church, but he quickly cut me off and said, "That stuff might work for you, but it doesn't work for me [because it is not real. What is real is the 'here and now' and nothing more]." I honored John's opinion and dropped the topic. He would be found dead about two weeks later (more on that in a minute).

When the condo board sent a final letter-of-warning about John, we asked him to vacate the condo by a specific date. On that date, John checked himself into a rehab center. However, he absconded from the rehab program and he was found dead three days later, floating face down in a body of water. It was classified as a non-suspicious death by local law enforcement, so a toxicological autopsy was not conducted to determine the presence of drugs or alcohol in the body. The body was simply buried.

A couple of weeks later, while I was alone with the remaining brother, Jim, I presented Jesus to him too, and he prayed the sinner's prayer with me! Hallelujah! I began uncontrollably crying or "groaning in the Spirit" during my short prayer time with Jim. (If you have never experienced groaning in the Spirit, then it is impossible to adequately describe it, but you can read Romans 8:26-27 for a glimmer of insight into it. It is extremely painful to experience, albeit it is not a physical pain *per se.*) Jim accepted the Lord and he repented of his sins during that prayer. While he never went to church, his heart was in the right place with the Lord, in preparation for eternity. Ironically and within a couple of weeks, he was diagnosed with throat cancer and then he was dead in three more weeks.

ANALYSIS

In this one case, we have two brothers who were both raised as Roman Catholics. One openly rejected the Lord Jesus Christ, at least initially, while the other, in humility and brokenness, confessed the Lordship of Christ. "A broken and contrite spirit, Oh God, you will not despise" (Psalm 51:17b). (continued on page 7)

(continued from page 6) Both brothers were given equal opportunities to be saved while they were here on earth, but only one openly accepted that opportunity, while the other openly rejected it, at least at the moment I presented it. Nevertheless, we trust in God's mercy that, during his final moments on earth shortly thereafter, John repented. That's how it is for all people; we either accept or reject the grace and mercy of Christ Jesus. Today is "the day of salvation" (2 Cor. 6:2), because we do not know what tomorrow brings.

Let us have deep and profound confidence and trust in the boundless mercy of Christ! Jesus, I trust in You! Jesus, I trust in Your love for me! I ask you to please join me in prayers imbued with trust and confidence in God's Divine Mercy for the speedy repose of these two brothers, who are truly our brothers in Christ Jesus our Lord.

November Prayer Vigil for the Holy Souls (2021)

While participating in PAS 602 Fundamentals of Practical Theology class last semester, one of the assignments included organizing a 'practical theology project' in which some aspect of theology was to be put into practice. For my project, I organized a small candle-lit 'prayer vigil' for the Holy Souls in Purgatory, which fittingly took place in November at a local Catholic cemetery. I invited friends and family to attend the vigil, and in preparation compiled and printed a program containing the prayers we were going to pray and procured blessed candles and glow-in-the-dark rosaries. The cemetery had a large, beautiful statue of the Crucifixion, where we gathered to begin. After leading an opening prayer as the candles were lit, we prayed together the "Prayer for the Holy Souls" by St. John Henry Newman and then walked through the cemetery praying the Chaplet of the Holy Souls, using glow-in-the-dark rosaries. After praying the Litany of the Holy Souls, we closed with a prayer petitioning God's peace and mercy on all His departed servants.


The Church exhorts the faithful to pray for the Holy Souls in Purgatory. While this is a pious practice to do daily, the Church especially recommends the faithful to do so in November – the month dedicated to the Holy Souls – in order to gain a plenary indulgence for the faithful departed. A plenary indulgence can "remove all temporal punishment due to forgiven sin" (Fr. John A. Hardon, S. J., Pocket Catholic <u>Dictionary</u>, 330). Providing one is properly disposed (fully unattached from all sin), there are three external conditions necessary for plenary indulgences: sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, and praying for the intentions of the Holy Father (Pocket Catholic Dictionary, 331). During the month of November, the faithful can receive a special indulgence by fulfilling these three normal conditions in addition to visiting/praying at a cemetery. While this particular indulgence is normally limited to the octave of All Souls' Day (the first 8 days of November), the Vatican granted the faithful an extension for this indulgence for the whole month of November in 2021 (Aleteia, "Vatican Again Extends November Indulgences").

This project really turned out to be a wonderful experience for all involved, and I am very grateful to have had the opportunity and occasion to plan it through my class at Holy Apostles College and Seminary. I hope to make this event into a November tradition in future!
